Called to serve God!

Samuel Isaak* lives in a rural area in the West of Tanzania. He's married to Sara and they have two children, a boy and a girl. Sara is pregnant with their third child. Samuel is a member of the Anglican Church in his village, where he teaches in the Sunday school and preaches nearly every Sunday. He also takes care of the elderly and sick, and visits them regularly.



The church is not very big. Every Sunday, around 50 people – not including children – attend the service. The church can't afford a pastor of its own. Most of the members of the congregation don't have a regular income. Each of them owns a small plot of land which helps them to survive. One of them is a teacher. He's the "big earner", so to speak. But even he can't survive without the regular harvest. Nonetheless, the church puts together an offering week by week to help fund the salary for their evangelist (roughly equivalent to a deacon).

One year ago, the elders in the church decided to send Samuel to Kibondo for training. There he was to learn the necessary skills for his role as an evangelist. He's already completed the 3-month foundation course and the 6-month advanced course. Now his church is collecting money to fund the final 9-month graduation course. Hopefully he'll then be able to return to his village and work as an evangelist. His salary will not be high. Evangelists earn around 5 to 20 euros per month. And he'll never be able to work as a pastor, because to do so, he would first have to go to Bible College in Kasulu.



The world needs lots of men like Samuel who serve faithfully. But they need training in order to acquire the necessary skills: Bible interpretation, homiletics, counselling and so much more.
